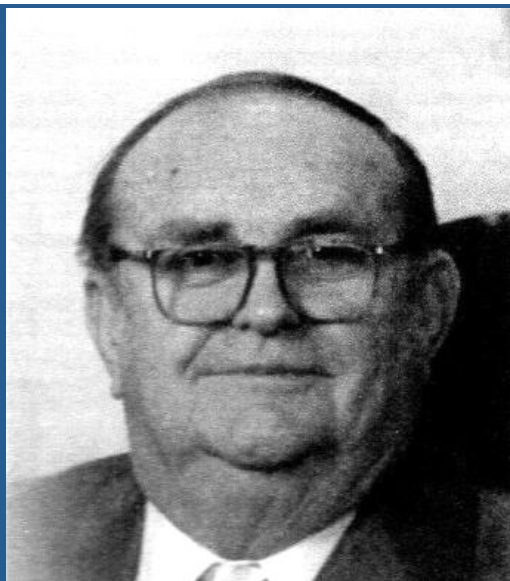
In loving memory of Champlin Jackson Carney,

Chester Folck, Mechanicsburg [Ohio]—Chester "Gene" Folck, 84, passed away, Monday [August 25, 2014].

Gene was born December 17, 1929, in Springfield, Ohio, and worked with the family's award-winning Jersey dairy herd, which, among other champions, included the Grand Champion Jersey Female for two consecutive years at both the U.S. and Canadian national Jersey shows. In the 1970s, Gene was one of the first cattlemen to import Simmental cattle from Switzerland and was the first to complete a successful embryo transfer in the eastern United States. Later, Gene started Folck's Country Cuts, selling meats and cheeses in the Clark and Champaign county areas.

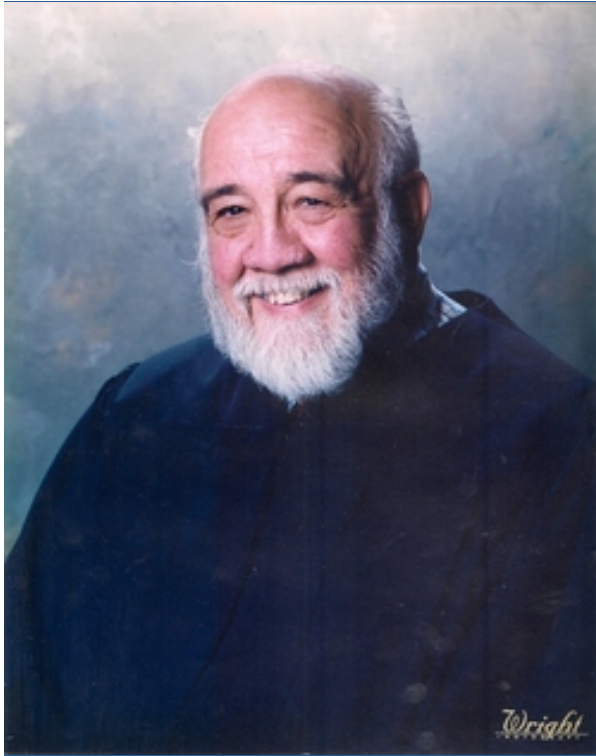

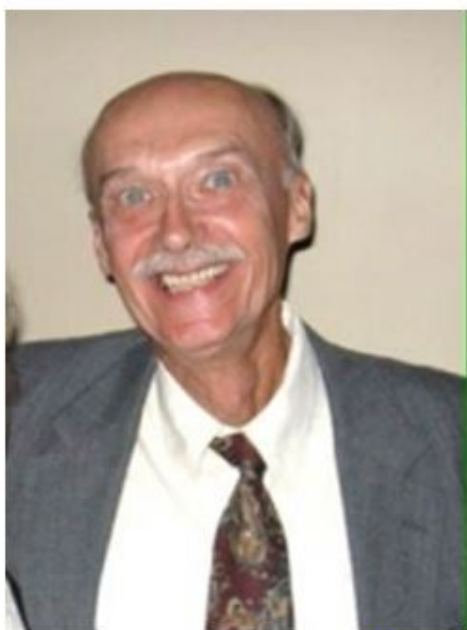


